




Moving toward a more family driven, prevention oriented, and holistic safety net

We have been busy over the past few weeks finalizing a Community of Hope white paper that serves as a summary of the findings from the September 26 summit. The summit brought together over 200 people who serve our community members in a wide variety of ways to talk about our safety net - what's working well, the challenges we face, the opportunities we have, and our next steps.

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A Holistic Approach to Case Management: Angie Dreier



In case you missed Child Welfare Caseworker Angie Dreier's opening remarks from the Community of Hope Summit, here's a sample:

The definition of *holistic* is "characterized by comprehension of the parts of something as intimately interconnected and explicable only by reference to the whole." So think about that as we

- Zoning limits in the county are preventing additional affordable **housing** facilities from being built.
- **Rental housing** in Boulder County has an extremely low vacancy rate, driving up prices.

As we look at addressing this together in the months and years ahead, our questions might be: "how do we as a community come together to ensure more affordable housing resources are available in Boulder County? What can we do collectively to create a vision for affordable housing that helps us all meet the needs of our clients?"

Partnership and Prevention

Emily's Story

When Emily came to the Housing Stabilization Program (HSP) she was homeless, fleeing her abusive partner, and caring for her son who has special needs. Scared, confused, and depressed, Emily began



working with staff from HSP and Safehouse Progressive Alliance for Nonviolence (SPAN) to create a safety plan and secure her basic needs for herself and her son.

Soon after obtaining her apartment through HSP funds, she went from having a large deficit in her budget to a surplus of almost \$400 a month. Emily advocated for herself at work and earned a promotion to manager. Her son, who had been to more schools than she could count, had significant improvement in his classroom behavior. At the time she transitioned out of HSP, Emily had already paid her next month's rent and still had almost a full month of rent in her savings account.

Similarly, if someone is working on access to food but has nutritional and dietary needs from a healthcare perspective that the food service agency may not be aware of, that collaboration can really reinforce those messages to those patients.

For a lot of members of our community, that first step in accessing services in our community is a hard one. There are stigmas, there are challenges to getting in the door - it's a scary prospect.
